WEEK IN REVIEW - NOV. 15 - 19, 2010

Superintendent's State of the Schools Luncheon - Our inaugural Superintendent's State of the Schools Luncheon took place Friday at 11:30 a.m. This luncheon gave us the opportunity to host local business and community leaders, HT alumni, State Board Members, community partners, parents, and students in a State of the Schools Address. 75 guests attended the luncheon.

The State of the Schools Address focused on the achievements that our district has experienced over the past seven years. Central to the message was that our district has advanced from five indicators passed and a rating of 'Academic Watch' to 23 indicators passed and a rating of 'Excellent.' The improvement represents a 460% gain. Other items presented include:

- * Graduation rate has increased from 84.7% to 91%
- * Graduation rate is better that state average and similar districts
- * District's Value Added Measure is rated at "+" or above.
- * 2010 2011 Goals
- * Post-Secondary Initiative
- * The last operational levy to bring new money to the district was passed in 1993
- * No other central Ohio district can claim that they operated 17 years without new monies
- * Our advancements have been accomplished without additional operational taxes

- * District recently refinanced school bonds and saved taxpayers nearly \$469,000

OFFICE OF TEACHING AND LEARNING

Math Teacher Leader – Our district works with the Teaching and Learning Collaborative -- a central Ohio education association that provides professional development to support quality math and science instruction. High School mathematics chair, Carole Morbitzer, is participating in this year's teacher leader professional development workshops. The quarterly workshops focus on engaging instructional strategies designed to help students apply math concepts. Carole will be sharing ideas from the workshops with other teachers throughout the district. She will also be sharing some of our good work on standards-based curriculum and assessment with the workshop leaders and participants.

Math Research – Hamilton is working with the Ohio State University to participate in another study. The Center for Cognitive Science's Cognitive Development Lab is conducting research on how young children develop number sense. Learning more about the acquisition of number sense is important to us because number sense is as critical to math learning as phonemic awareness is to reading. The purpose of the research is to identify the best strategies for improving number sense in preschoolers and second graders. Mrs. Strahm and Mrs. Carley will be coordinating the research with the Ohio State University.

Integrated Science Tutoring - This year, attendance is greater than in the past, which has shown student commitment to achievement. The tutoring sessions held every Wednesday after school include a diverse combination of students needing extra help with understanding concepts, those students who want the extra positive reinforcement and those students who want to retake a quiz, to achieve a higher grade. The tutoring time allows for a relaxed environment where students do not feel so "on the spot" about asking questions. Instead of the more structured classroom environment, students are free to come for part or all of the tutoring and work out questions and concepts together or by themselves. To keep a group of students that typically ranges 50+ participants under control and productive, the Science Department relies on the help of Mrs. Patino and volunteer student tutors from the National Honors Society.

National Technology Plan Released: U.S. Secretary of Education Arne Duncan released on November 9, 2010 the U.S. Department of Education's National Technology Plan (NETP). The plan is entitled "Transforming American Education: Learning Powered by Technology", and was developed with stakeholder input by the U.S. DOE's Office of Educational Technology.

The plan provides a comprehensive vision for helping classroom teachers transform student learning through technology in five areas, and is focused on supporting more individualized and real-world learning activities to ensure that students keep pace with the 21st century. The plan will support the President's goal to increase college completion by 2020 and close the achievement gap, so that all students graduate from high school ready to succeed in college and careers.

The plan sets out to do the following:

Learning: Change the learning process so it's more engaging and tailored to students' needs and interests.

Assessment: Measure student progress on the full range of college and career ready standards and use real time data for continuous improvement.

Teaching: Connect teachers to the tools, resources, experts and peers they need to be highly effective and supported.

Infrastructure: Provide broadband connectivity for all students, everywhere-in schools, throughout communities and in students' homes. Productivity: Use technology to help schools become more productive and accelerate student achievement while managing costs.

The NETP also includes plans to fund the creation of open-source resources for schools and online professional learning communities for teachers.

As teams, we often worry about pushing students out of our protective setting into the world of general education. Success depends on so many factors, most important of which is the buy in of the general education teacher. Please note the email below from Mr. Borkow.

"This is a HUGE step for KR. KR is one of my students from Ebbeskotte/Pierce's room. Two days ago we had our "Day of Demos" where I perform 15 demonstrations and students decide whether the demonstrations indicate a chemical or physical change. One of the demonstrations involves having a student come up to the front of the class and mix chemicals together to produce a glowing light (artificial fire-fly). When I asked for a volunteer, KR raised his hand and came to the front of the room. The demonstration involved having KR be the center of attention. This is by far the most involvement I have ever seen from KR and is a big step since KR does not like to be singled out and typically freezes when faced with such social challenges." - *Philip S. Math Intervention Assists Struggling Math Students - Math Intervention was set up four year ago for students who were not successful on their Ohio Achievement Test. The students that have Math Intervention also have a regular math class. In Math Intervention the goal is to stay two or three weeks behind the regular math teacher to help fill the gaps if they have missed anything. In the 7th grade classes they are currently finishing up a unit on Graphing: Graphing Linear Equations and Linear Inequalities. The next topic will be finding area of different shapes. Students will create a dream bedroom with their knowledge of area. In the 8th grade classes they have been working on a different type of graphing. They have learned about Bar Graphs, Line Graphs, Circle or Pie Graphs, Scatter plots, and others. Also every Thursday and Friday are Science Days. Work is done out of a Science book and then the topics topics are discussed. Next in 8th grade the students will be studying probability. The students will play a game of rock, paper, and scissors and learn how that game involves probability.

HAMILTON ELEMENTARY SCHOOL

Not Your Ordinary Parent/Teacher Conference - Kids who came with their parents were able to enjoy several activities in the cafeteria Tuesday and Thursday. Civil Rights Data Collection - Mr. Morrison has started the process to submit district based data to the Office of Civil Rights. The purpose of the U.S. Department of Education (ED) 2009-10 Civil Rights Data Collection (CRDC) is to obtain data about how well the nation's public school districts and elementary and secondary schools are doing in fulfilling their obligation to provide equal educational opportunity. The CRDC collects a variety of information, including student enrollment and educational programs and services disaggregated by race/ethnicity, sex, limited English proficiency, and disability. The CRDC is a longstanding and important aspect of the Department's Office for Civil Rights (OCR) overall strategy for administering and enforcing the civil rights statutes for which it is responsible. This information is also used by other ED offices as well as policymakers and researchers outside of ED.

HAMILTON INTERMEDIATE SCHOOL

Intermediate Teachers Train On How To Improve Communication With Technology - During the two hour delay on Wednesday, November 17, the teachers at the Intermediate building were educated on how to utilize technology in the classroom and expand on ways to communicate with families. Ms. Bright and Mr. Beggrow trained all the teachers on how to use iMovie and SMART Recorder to enhance their lessons. After the in-service, the staff now has the knowledge to use these tools to make video clips and podcast that will help students and their families be better informed about what is happening in the classroom.

Intermediate Staff Participates In Health Screenings - On Wednesday, majority of the Intermediate building's staff members participated in a voluntary health screening. They took about 20 minutes of their day to meet with the medical team sent by our insurance carrier. Staff members received valuable information about their blood pressure, cholesterol levels, BMI, and sugar levels.
